My name is Brian Linderholm. I currently work for the Mental Health Association of Nebraska as a data entry/exit specialist in the H.O.P.E. office. H.O.P.E. is an acronym that stands for Higher Opportunities through the Power of Employment. We help marginalized participants such as people in correctional facilities who are eligible for work-release and those who have mental health diagnoses to obtain employment.

I'm a never-married bachelor with no children. I currently live in a group home here in Lincoln, Nebraska as I have been diagnosed with paranoid schizophrenia. I have been stable on antipsychotic medications for decades now. I was once a participant in the H.O.P.E. program, but after a twelve-week internship arranged by Nebraska Vocational Rehabilitation, I was offered a position with the H.O.P.E. re-entry team. I worked at Honu Home throughout most of 2022. Honu Home is a short-term residence for participants leaving a correctional facility and who want to obtain paid employment and then long term housing.

Before I began working for H.O.P.E., I had been chronically unemployed for about fifteen years. I had failed an attempt at getting a Bachelor of Science Degree in IT from 2012-2016 in order to upgrade my Associate of Applied Science in Computer Programming at Kaplan University which later failed financially. I was mostly resigned to being out of work for the rest of my life. But due to fortunate timing, a position within MHA-Nebraska opened. Once I had finished my internship through Nebraska VR, I became employed once again in early 2022 during the height of the COVID era. Finally, before 2007, I worked for the Mental Health Voter Empowerment Project through a faith-based initiative federal grant going back to 2002, again with MHA-Nebraska once they began hosting the project, doing the same type of work that I do now.


